Exam Description: The UExcel examination in Introduction to Psychology measures knowledge and understanding of the material typically taught in a one-semester, three-credit, lower-level survey course in a baccalaureate program. The examination measures knowledge and understanding of the theories and principles of general psychology and the ability to apply this information to everyday life examples. The content of the examination consists of 11 major categories: Psychological Disorders and Therapy, Learning and Memory, The Science of Psychology, Social Psychology, Cognition and Intelligence, Human Development, Motivation and Emotion, Biological Influences on Behavior, Personality, Consciousness, Sensation and Perception. No prior course work in psychology is assumed.

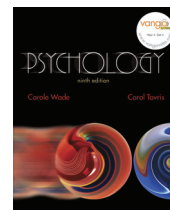
